PREPARING + APPLYING

CEP is a competitive, two-year, undergraduate major at the University of Washington. There are no prerequisites, but CEP 200: Intro to CEP is recommended to gain a better understanding of the program. The ideal CEP candidate has a clear educational direction and is working towards that direction both in and outside the classroom. Strong CEP candidates can communicate their passions and goals, both written and verbally, as well as their employment history, extracurricular activities, travel experiences, skills, and hobbies. Finally, while GPA is not everything, grades are an important indicator on how you perform in an academic setting.

To apply, you must have a minimum cumulative GPA of 2.5; be on track to complete 90 credits by the time you begin CEP; and show significant progress towards completing UW's general education requirements.

Our application process consists of the following:

- Personal statement
- Curriculum vitae
- Unofficial transcript
- Interview (scheduled after receipt of your application)

Our priority application deadline is February 15th, with rolling admissions until all spots are filled.
